# Clare Homelessness Action Plan

2013 - 2018



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#### INTRODUCTION AND CONTEXT

The definition of homelessness is set out in the Housing Act of 1988 as:

A person shall be regarded by a housing authority as being homeless for the purpose of this Act if....

- There is no accommodation available which in the opinion of the authority he, together with any other person who normally resides with him or who might reasonably be expected to reside with him can reasonably occupy or remain in occupation of; or
- 2. He is living in a hospital, county home, night shelter, or other institution and is so living because he has no accommodation of the kind referred to in paragraph (1).
- 3. He is, in the opinion of the authority, unable to provide accommodation from his own resources.

In accordance with the Housing (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 2009, Limerick City Council as designated Lead Authority for the Mid-West Region led the Regional Homelessness Management Group in the preparation of a new Mid West Regional Homelessness Action Plan for the period 2013 to 2018.

The Regional Plan has been developed following the principles of the current national homelessness strategy "The Way Home: A Strategy to Address Adult Homelessness in Ireland 2008 – 2013". It has also taken cognisance of the Government's Housing Policy Statement released in June 2011, which highlighted the need to explore a Housing First (Led) approach and to achieve a maximum return for the resources invested in homeless services.

The Mid-West Regional Homelessness Action Plan 2013 -2018 will provide a platform for the continued provision of high quality person focused services with access to the appropriate supports to live independently, with an emphasis on strengthening preventative policies, procedures, working relationships and services to reduce levels of repeat homelessness, thus reducing the overall level of homelessness within the region.

The Clare Homelessness Action Plan 2013-2018 has been developed by The Clare Homelessness Alliance (CHA), which is representative of service providers in the county. The CHA provides a forum for the sharing of information and development of awareness of issues and services impacting on the homeless. It also promotes best practice in service delivery and provides essential links between service providers.

The Clare Homelessness Action Plan 2013-2018 will assist in the delivery of the actions in the Mid-West Regional Homelessness Action Plan 2013–2018. It also acknowledges and has regard to the more recent National Homelessness Policy Statement issued in February, 2013. The strategic actions outlined in the Plan are targeted to assist those experiencing homelessness as far as possible, and secondly to minimise the duration and occurrence of homelessness in accordance with national policy. The delivery of the actions contained in the plan will provide a key level of involvement to Voluntary and Statutory groups at local level.

The CHA will monitor and review implementation of the Actions in the Clare Homelessness Action Plan 2013-2018 on an ongoing basis and will report annually through the Council's Strategic Policy Committee.
