





# Bat Walk of St Flannan's Graveyard and Killaloe Canal

To celebrate Heritage Week 2024, and in recognition of Community Heritage Funding received to restore the gates at St Flannan's Cathedral and Graveyard, there will be a Bat Walk guided by Anna Collins of Bat Conservation Ireland & Kildare Bat Group on Saturday 24th August at 8.30pm. This event will commence in St Flannan's Cathedral with a brief talk about the wonder of bats and the equipment we will use to detect them on the walk. It will then progress through St Flannan's Graveyard and all along the Killaloe Canal, learning as we go about these fascinating flying mammals, detecting them with bat detectors and sighting the different species as they go out foraging for the night. This will be a 60+ minute walk over some waterside bumpy terrain at dusk and in darkness, waterproof walking wear is recommended. It is not suitable for any wheeled modes of transport such as bicycles or scooters as noise from these will be picked up by the bat detectors. The walk is not suitable for young children due to its proximity to the waterside in low light conditions.

# Bicentenary of Bealaclugga Bridge in Spanish Point

Spanish Point Community Group is holding a talk on Saturday August 17th to commemorate the bicentenary of Bealaclugga Bridge in Spanish Point. Building of the bridge commenced in 1822 and it was commissioned in 1824. It was designed by John Killaly and Thomas Morony. This lancet arch bridge is an impressive feat of engineering. As a result of its existence the coast road to North Clare was developed which was instrumental in the development of tourism in the area at the time. Today, this bridge continues its vital role along the Wild Atlantic Way. It links North Clare to West Clare and provides a connection for both locals and tourists, as it has for the last two hundred years. A commemorative limestone plaque will be unveiled adjacent to the Bellbridge Hotel. An Audio Guide, developed by Spanish Point Community Group, provides the complete history of the bridge. A QR code to access the audio guide is also at this location. Light refreshments will be available in the Bellbridge Hotel afterwards.

#### Ardnacrusha: Tour of ESB Hydro-Electric Station

Visitors are welcomed to the Ardnacrusha Experience at the visitors' centre before going out on site to view the impressive headrace canal, locks and tailrace. Once inside the station, the living heritage of the Shannon Scheme is brought to life through a series of animations which celebrate the history and impact of this iconic project. Visitors are given access to the very heart of the station with unique views of the turbine hall and a visit to the original control room.

The 90-minute tour of Ardnacrusha hydro-electric station takes visitors on a journey which began in 1925 with an ambitious vision to harness the power of water to electrify the fledgling Irish State. The tour demonstrates the transformative role electricity has played in enhancing Irish life since construction of the station was complete almost a century ago, and highlights how the ESB, through its Driven to Make a Difference: Net Zero by 2040 strategy, is embracing the next generation of renewables, including the development of onshore and offshore wind projects, continuing the legacy of Ardnacrusha by creating a brighter future for all.

Things to note before booking an Ardnacrusha Experience Tour.

Ardnacrusha is a working hydro station which will be operational on the day of your visit.

Visitors should observe the signage in place and follow the guidance of their guide and station staff at all times.

Parents will be responsible for their children at all times.

During your visit you will be required to wear Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) including a hi-vis jacket, safety hat and safety glasses. These will be provided.

Some of the tour takes place out-of-doors, please wear sturdy shoes and dress appropriately for the Irish weather!

The tour is only partially accessible for wheelchair users or persons with limited mobility as there are over 100 steps to be negotiated.

People with Hearing or Visual Impairment may not be able to access all activities however, the overall tour should still provide an enjoyable experience.

Visitors should arrive around 10 minutes before their scheduled tour time.

# Dying & Spinning on a Drop Spindle

Join our animator Geraldine as she discusses and performs the ancient Irish craft of wool spinning on a traditional spindle.

Wool Spinning is the processing of the fleece of a sheep. This craft has been practiced in Ireland since sheep were first introduced by Neolithic farmers over 6000 years ago. Originally, women spun the wool using nothing more elaborate than a spindle with a weight attached. Later, spinning wheels became more widespread and these simple devices enabled the spinner to twist the fibres into a single continuous thread more efficiently.

# Forestry & Water Quality - The Physical & Cultural Connections



This Heritage Week event is aimed at forestry practitioners, forestry owners and landowners. It will review how forestry can play a positive role in restoring, protecting and enhancing local water quality, instream habitat and the riparian biodiversity of local waterbodies and play a leading role in mitigating the impacts of poorly selected forest sites. It will examine tree species, buffer zones and practices that can support environmental benefits along watercourses to provide the shade to protect fish from thermal stress and how a well-designed plan for riparian trees can also provide a buffer from the impacts of other land use practices.

# Graveyard Survey Training at St Fachnan's Cathedral, Kilfenora



The graveyard at St Fachnan's Cathedral has a long history of use; the earliest part of the present Cathedral building was built in 1189, on the site of an early ecclesiastical foundation which was established by St Fachnan in the 6th century. It remains in active use as a burial ground for the local community. This year, a graveyard survey and conservation management plan is being carried out, the aim of which is to document, map, and assess the condition of graves and markers on the site. Graveyard surveys serve as an invaluable tool for the preservation of historical and cultural heritage, as well as broadening our understanding of our local history. During Heritage Week, we will provide two training workshops for members of the public, showcasing graveyard recording techniques, data recording protocols, and safety procedures. This training will be led by local archaeologist Edel Barry, and Elaine Lynch, Field Monument Advisor for Co. Clare.

#### Maire Rua and her Castles in Clare

Maire Rua is a legendary figure in Co. Clare, particularly associated with Leamanagh Castle, a National Monument on the border between Kilnaboy and Kilfenora. In this area Maire Rua has achieved a degree of notoriety, with many myths being told of her cruelty and cunning. In reality Maire Rua was a powerful woman in 17th century Ireland, a time of great social upheaval. She was a member of the Gaelic Irish aristocracy, born to the McMahon clan and marrying into the Neylon family at Dysart O'Dea. Her second husband, Conor O'Brien of Leamanagh, died fighting against Cromwellian forces, and shortly thereafter she married a Cromwellian officer, in an expedient attempt to save her estate at Leamangh for her son. She had also managed the estate of her first husband until her eldest son from her first marriage came of age, proving her abilities and prowess at a time when society was dominated by men.

Risteard (Dick) UaCroinin, who restored Dysert O'Dea Castle in 1985-6, served as Clare County Archaeologist and Architectural Conservation Officer from 2000 until his retirement in 2019. He now works as an architectural heritage consultant. He will tell the story of Maire Rua and her connection to five different castles in Co. Clare in this fascinating presentation during Heritage Week.

#### Whale Watch Ireland 2023

This is an opportunity to hear the story of Hastings Farmhouse and the project to restore it as a community heritage venue. You will see a demonstration of traditional mud wall building and lime rendering in action. Hastings Farmhouse is a traditional nineteenth century farmhouse built using a combination of mud, stone and brick. The restoration project is under the guidance of conservation professionals who have produced a specification for the reconstruction of the mud walls of the farmhouse and outbuilding. The Heritage Week event will feature a demonstration of the methodology to be employed in the rebuilding of the mud wall. The demonstration will preview the techniques to be offered in two mud wall building and lime render workshops which will take place on 2nd to 4th and 9th to 11th of September. The Sixmilebridge Folk group will provide traditional music entertainment and light refreshments will be served. This is a family event to learn about life in Shannon before the building of the modern town. All are welcome.

The Hastings family took up residence at the farmhouse in Tullyvarraga in 1847 at the height of the famine. The farmhouse was surrounded by a c. 30 acre farm and the traditional way of life it represented remained virtually unchanged throughout the next hundred and twenty years. Successive generations of the Hastings family farmed the surrounding land and probably fished in the estuary less than 100 metres to the south.. There was no electricity or running water; cooking was done over the open fire and light provided by candle or kerosene lamps. Water was fetched from a nearby well. The Hastings family played a part in the War of Independence and the house served as a safe-house for the Irish Army. General Lucas, a high ranking British General who was captured in Cork spent part of his captivity under guard at Hastings Farmhouse. Hear the story of that event and how his granddaughter visited Hastings Farmhouse in 2012.

# Oral Histories of Clare Women - a Public Interview with Kitty Leyden

This is a public interview with Kitty Leyden from Tulla, Co. Clare, by broadcaster and Cuimhneamh an Chláir project manager, Paula Carroll.

88 year old Kitty Leyden embodies an important aspect of the oral histories of Co. Clare. She was the youngest of 11, born on a small farm in West Clare. She emigrated to New York and lived her young years in that teeming city. Returning home, she settled in Tulla, and raised 8 children. Hers is the story of the ordinary joys and hardships of women's lives in mid-20th century rural Ireland. The difference is that she tells it with great humour and insight, and a turn of phrase that only the gifted storyteller has. Whether it's bareback donkey-riding, West Clare house dances, or living the emigrant life in New York, Kitty Leyden's stories help us connect with our own social history and cultural identity.

# Religion, Magic and The Cure - The Holy Wells of the Burren

There over 3,000 holy wells in Ireland. Pre-Christian in origin, the well was a vibrant theatre of indigenous spirituality and colourful folk medicine in pre-Famine times. Some sites still attract significant numbers of devotees today. The Burren is home to almost fifty wells, several of which will feature in this presentation, including new information on St Fachnan's Well, Kilfenora.

This talk by Tony Kirby draws on recent research and includes new insights into the history, geography, folklore and hydrogeology of Burren holy wells, as well as contextualising the "Irish martial arts" and faction fighting which took place at some of the sites.

Tony Kirby is a full-time and well-known Burren walk guide. He recently completed an audit of almost forty holy wells in North Clare as part of the Clare Holy Wells Project under the auspices of the Heritage Council and Clare County Council. Tony is the author of "The Burren and the Aran Islands - A Walking Guide".

# Mud, Lime and Timber: Building a house 200 years ago

This is an opportunity to hear the story of Hastings Farmhouse and the project to restore it as a community heritage venue. You will see a demonstration of traditional mud wall building and lime rendering in action. Hastings Farmhouse is a traditional nineteenth century farmhouse built using a combination of mud, stone and brick. The restoration project is under the guidance of conservation professionals who have produced a specification for the reconstruction of the mud walls of the farmhouse and outbuilding. The Heritage Week event will feature a demonstration of the methodology to be employed in the rebuilding of the mud wall. The demonstration will preview the techniques to be offered in two mud wall building and lime render workshops which will take place on 2nd to 4th and 9th to 11th of September. The Sixmilebridge Folk group will provide traditional music entertainment and light refreshments will be served. This is a family event to learn about life in Shannon before the building of the modern town. All are welcome.

The Hastings family took up residence at the farmhouse in Tullyvarraga in 1847 at the height of the famine. The farmhouse was surrounded by a c. 30 acre farm and the traditional way of life it represented remained virtually unchanged throughout the next hundred and twenty years. Successive generations of the Hastings family farmed the surrounding land and probably fished in the estuary less than 100 metres to the south.. There was no electricity or running water; cooking was done over the open fire and light provided by candle or kerosene lamps. Water was fetched from a nearby well. The Hastings family played a part in the War of Independence and the house served as a safehouse for the Irish Army. General Lucas, a high ranking British General who was captured in Cork spent part of his captivity under guard at Hastings Farmhouse. Hear the story of that event and how his granddaughter visited Hastings Farmhouse in 2012.

# The harp - the story of Ireland's national instrument

The harp is an ancient instrument, with many variants around the world. The Irish harp (cláirseach) and its 'Celtic cousins' in Scotland, Wales and Brittany have existed in some form for some 2000 years – and the harp became a heraldic symbol for Ireland as long ago as the 1300s. The story of the harp in Ireland is a fascinating one, and is intrinsic to the development of what is now

termed Irish traditional music - although as a demanding instrument, it is less commonly played than the fiddle, flute and whistle. The harp repertoire has evolved from the ancient traditions of celtic bards through the renaissance and classical periods – epitomised by Ireland's most famous composer, the blind harper Turlough O'Carolan (1670-1738) – and on into more experimental use in modern times. Aisling Lyons will take us on a journey through the history of the harp, demonstrating its versatility through her own playing. Aisling is an award-winning musician and composer from County Clare, described as 'the finest Irish harper at work today' by Songlines Magazine after the release of her debut album 'Aistear' (2021). She is the holder of 8 All-Ireland titles and has performed around the world both as a soloist and band member.

# Thomas Westropp – the master discoverer of the Burren

This presentation by Liam Irwin will shine a light on one of Ireland's most remarkable experts on ancient monuments. Thomas Johnson Westropp (1860-1922) remains the primary source of archaeological information on counties Clare and Limerick – and especially the Burren – such was the excellence of his discovery work. He was a leading figure at the Royal Society of Antiquaries of Ireland, and appointed its president in 1916.

Westropp's many publications – containing hundreds of his sketches and photographs – cover megalithic tombs, iron age forts, castles, religious buildings, and also folklore and custom relating to monuments, lakes, rivers and wells. (The Burren Visitor Centre has several items of Westropp memorabilia on display.)

# Wild Seed Saving for Biodiversity

A practical workshop introducing the participants to the joy of saving seeds from local wild plants, helping to support the regeneration of our precious indigenous flora species, providing suitable floral resources for wild pollinator species and helping to protect Ireland's indigenous genetic diversity.

The workshop will be based on recommended best practice for saving seeds from the wild. We will look at the Flora Protection Order, 2015 and the conservation status of wild plants. The participants will be introduced to a simple wild seed saving protocol that protects both the plants and their habitats.

We will explore why it is important to save local indigenous wild seed for conservation, for community ecology and habitat regeneration projects. We will also explore why we need to stop introducing non- native wild flower seed mixes into wild habitats, ecosystems and private gardens. Practical sessions will include: identification of native wild plants; saving seeds from common wild herbaceous plants; identifying when seeds are ripe for harvesting; best practice for collecting, processing, storing and sowing seed; and what is needed for a basic seed saving toolkit. This workshop will be facilitated by ecologist Áine Ni Fhlatharta, MSc. and hosted by the team of Lough Grainey Nature Sanctuary.



The 2024 award categories are as follows:
National Heritage Hero Award: Awarded to an individual or organisation that has demonstrated – over a substantial period of time – an outstanding contribution to the protection and promotion of heritage. This award is based on nominations from the public.

Living Heritage Award: Awarded to the event or project that successfully encouraged a greater appreciation of an element of our Living Heritage-traditional crafts, skills and practices.

Wild Child Award: Awarded to an event or project that successfully encouraged children and families to get outdoors and enjoy and explore the heritage and biodiversity in their locality; to look at the world around them differently; to open their eyes to the diverse beauty of the landscape in their area.

Water Heritage Award: Awarded to an event or project that best explored how a canal, river, lake or sea shaped the heritage of a locality or celebrates water as an integral part of our natural heritage, as well as being a vital part of our future, or reflects on what more we can do to conserve this valuable resource.
